Introduction to the Lesson

The following lesson addresses two important aspects of ministry. In many ways these two aspects can make or break all work we intend to do for Christ. The first is **planning**. Nehemiah has permission from Artaxerxes along with protection to do the work. He in effect has a greenlight to begin working. However, we find that Nehemiah is extremely systematic in his work (This may have helped him to the position he held in the court of Artaxerxes) and he does not jump into rebuilding the wall. He begins by analyzing the work to be done. The next make or break term is **togetherness**. After determining the work to be done, Nehemiah addresses the people to get them engaged in the work. The amazing terms that arises over and again in this portion of Nehemiah (2:11-3:31) are "we, us, next to, and beside". Each term carries the idea that no singular person did the work. Their success happened because they did the work together. The community of Jerusalem engaged in rebuilding the wall and setting the gates. This idea of togetherness and team aspect represents the approach God has for His church.

I. The Importance of Planning!

Below, you see a basic sketch of the city of Jerusalem and the wall that surrounded it during Nehemiah's time (See Roman numeral II). Notice the sections of the wall. See the many gates that would have been in disrepair. Can you imagine the challenge of rebuilding a wall that was 4,018 meters long (2.4966 mi), with an average height of 12 meters (39.37 feet) and an average thickness of 2.5 meters (8.2 feet). To complete this task in 52 days (Nehemiah 6:13) was a significant task. This task could not have been accomplished without extensive planning. But planning does not occur in an effective manner without key steps.


What can you do within your own church to ensure that God's name and the perception of His people are not a disgrace?

II. The Importance of Togetherness—Nehemiah 2: 20-3:31

Team Activity: Beginning with Nehemiah 3: 1-31 write in the verses which describe who repaired each section.

Directions: Assign a set of verses to each person in the group. They will use their verses to list what was done. This will be completed between weeks 2 and 3 to share with the team at the beginning of Lesson 3.



The Key to Teamwork

Nehemiah Chapter 3 is a recording of the people who worked to rebuild the wall. The listing is not the total list of names who worked on each piece of the wall. You will find groups named such as those in verse 5 which states the men of Tekoa, or verse 13 which names Hanun and residents or verse 17 which states the Levites under the direction of Binnui. In each description, it can be concluded that this work was only completed through the efforts of a large group of people united in a singular goal.

CONSIDER THIS!

- No one name is shown as more important than the other
- No one works on more than one part of the wall
- Each person/group must complete their task for the whole wall to be fixed.

What would it take for you to be engaged in work that did not include your name in the final product? What behind the scenes work does the Lord want you to participate in for His kingdom?
